# **QUEEN LION'S CORNER**



# GROWING TO MEET THE NEED: EXPANDING THE MINERAL DAILY BREAD FOOD BANK

Expanding the Mineral Daily Bread Food Bank: Meeting the Growing Need Hunger is a harsh reality for too many families in Lewis and Pierce Counties. The Mineral Daily Bread Food Bank has been working hard to meet rising demand, serving more than twice as many families in 2024 as the previous year. However, our biggest challenge isn't getting food—it's having enough space to store it.

To address this, Lion Starla and I have, your District 19N Hunger Co-Chairs, have successfully submitted a hunger grant application to LCIF (Lions Clubs International Foundation). This effort has strong backing from local officials, state representatives, Lions clubs, and District Leadership. While we await the grant decision in May, our work isn't done.

We need to raise an additional \$50,000 to fully fund this project, with a goal to secure the funds by July and break ground this fall. To achieve this, we are launching fundraising initiatives with community organizations and seeking additional grants.

#### **WHY THIS MATTERS:**

- **Keeping Up with Demand:** In 2024, we served over 657 families—nearly 10,000 individuals. More storage means no one leaves empty-handed.
- **More Stability:** Expanded space ensures families receive consistent food support.
- Future Preparedness: This project will sustain us for years to come.
- **Emergency Readiness:** We aim to store 3-4 weeks' worth of food for crises like natural disasters or supply chain disruptions.

Together, we have the power to effect significant change within our community. We invite you to join us in these upcoming fundraising efforts, confident that our collective dedication will make a profound impact.

If you'd like to help—whether by donating, volunteering, or spreading the word—we'd love to hear from you. Together, we can ensure no one in our community goes hungry.

# Multiple District 19 History

Continuing from last month, we pick up where we left off with the ongoing developments in District 19...

# District 19: A Legacy of Growth and Organization

By 1936, District 19 had expanded to 30 clubs and 1,287 members, prompting local leaders to establish a "Board of Control" to improve organization. In 1927, International introduced zones, with District Governors appointing their cabinets. Northern Idaho joined District 19 in 1936, though its first clubs didn't form until 1941. Alaska briefly became part of the district in 1943 before reorganizing as District 49. By 1939, the district had grown to 55 clubs, governed by a District Governor and five Deputies.

By 1944, District 19 had 87 clubs and 3,678 members, and by 1946, it had expanded to 111 clubs and 6,254 members.

Recognizing the challenges of a single-district structure, leaders developed a new organizational plan while traveling from Victoria to Vancouver.

In 1947–48, District 19 officially became a multiple district covering Washington, Northern Idaho, and British Columbia. It was divided into five districts, each led by an elected District Governor, and the role of Zone Chairpersons was expanded. This structure remains the foundation of Multiple District 19 today.
